occupation. She has a thriving market for her limited-edition dolls, her sculpted teddy bear masks, exclusive doll-mold designs, patterns and decorative wall mountings. "I'm never bored. There is always a new project on the drawing board."

- Star Gazing: "I have an inspiration board that I pin things on. I study the positioning and the gestures. It's not unusual to see movie celebrities pinned in among photos of supermodels and Victorian and Art Deco prints. I like to study well-known celebrities for face shape and expression. My pieces may have a hint of who inspired it, but I leave that up to the viewer to guess."
- Future Factor: "I always have a great number of projects to choose from. I don't think about what I will do next until I am sitting down to do it. I have 2,000 years of history and art to inspire me. I am always open to new ideas."
